### **INTRODUCTION**

Tourism, a vast industry globally, plays a pivotal role in fostering sustainable development and offers significant economic, environmental, and socio-cultural prospects for numerous local communities (Sharply, 2000). Sustainable tourism has now become an integral aspect within academia and policy-making circles, embraced by both public and private sectors across various levels of governance and in organizations such as the United Nations World Tourism Organization (UNWTO), United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP), and the World Travel and Tourism Council (WTTC) (Hall, 2011).

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Terms like “green,” “sustainable,” and “eco-friendly” have taken center stage in tourism policy documents, regulations, and promotional materials (Bowman, 2011). Communities serve as vital motivations for tourists seeking to immerse themselves in different ways of life and cultural offerings, while also shaping the landscapes that tourists often seek to experience (Richards & Hall, 2000). Despite this, the focus of tourism development agendas has often sidelined local communities, despite their crucial role in the tourism product (Murphy, 1985). Consequently, the efficacy of tourism as a tool for development remains a subject of debate among scholars and advocates worldwide. The success of any tourism endeavor hinges upon the goodwill and cooperation of the host community (Murphy, 1985).

Moreover, the increasing global footprint of tourism, with 1.3 billion international tourists travelling worldwide (UNWTO, 2024), raises concerns among planners and policymakers regarding how to strike a balance between tourism development and the sustainability of destination communities. In the Indian Himalayan Region (IHR), tourism has emerged as one of the fastest-growing economic sectors, offering lucrative opportunities for economic progress fueled by the region’s awe-inspiring landscapes and rich cultural heritage (Niti Aayog, 2018). While tourism brings economic benefits such as job opportunities for local mountain communities and revenues for state governments and private businesses, introducing sustainability into the discourse of tourism development in the IHR necessitates various forms of tourism that address issues of equity, efficiency, innovation, and carrying capacity. Sustainable community-based tourism promotion and development have emerged as a prominent aspect of the global tourism debate in recent years (Liu 2003; Buckley, 2012; Butcher, 2007; Richards & Hall, 2000; Godde, 1999).
