1. INTRODUCTION

1. Natural attractions: Rural areas have the purest landscapes including mountains, forests, rivers and lakes, which attracts visitors who enjoy activities such as fishing, hiking and bird watching (Sharpley & Roberts, 2004). Mornings in rural areas are also very attractive with fresh air.
2. Cultural heritage: Rural tourism allows visitors to be drawn into cultural crafts, festivals and many other practices of rural communities. This attraction promotes cultural exchange and preserves local heritage (MacDonald & Jolliffe, 2003).
3. Adventure Places: Rural regions offer a boon for adventure sports like mountain biking, rock climbing and zip-lining. Ecotourism focuses on sustainable ways of travel, encouraging tourists to explore natural areas and supporting conservation efforts (Weaver, 2016).
4. Tranquility and Wellness: The tranquil and unpolluted environment of rural areas is ideal for wellness tourism, which includes activities such as yoga, spa visits and meditation for tourists seeking relaxation and mental revitalization (Smith & Puczko, 2009).
