The dynamics of modern workplaces are increasingly characterized by complexity, driven by diverse interpersonal relationships, intricate organizational structures, and evolving cultural norms. Within this environment, conflict is inevitable but also potentially transformative. However, traditional conflict resolution methods often focus solely on surface-level disputes, leaving unaddressed the deeper emotional and psychological dimensions of workplace discord. This oversight can perpetuate unresolved tensions, impacting morale, productivity, and the overall health of an organization. Therapeutic conflictology emerges as a holistic approach that integrates therapeutic techniques—such as mindfulness, cognitive-behavioral methods, and emotional intelligence training—with traditional conflict resolution frameworks. By addressing the emotional roots of conflict, therapeutic conflictology fosters resilience, collaboration, and sustained harmony within workplace teams.

One of the foundational aspects of therapeutic conflictology lies in its focus on creativity and emotional expression as pathways to resolution. Marian Liebmann's *Arts Approaches to Conflict* (1996) highlights how methods such as drama, visual arts, and storytelling can uncover hidden emotional tensions that fuel workplace disputes. These artistic approaches provide employees with tools to articulate their perspectives, fostering empathy and deeper understanding among team members. This perspective is supported by recent research in *Mental Health and Conflicts* (Berstein, 2022), which emphasizes the importance of validating diverse emotional experiences within conflict resolution processes. Together, these insights suggest that addressing the emotional dimensions of workplace disputes can lead to more meaningful and lasting resolutions.

The role of alternative frameworks in conflict resolution has also gained traction in recent years, particularly those that prioritize emotional healing and relational repair. Michal Alberstein's exploration of "The Law of Alternatives" (2016) examines how approaches like restorative justice and therapeutic jurisprudence integrate emotional acknowledgment into conflict resolution. Alberstein highlights that such methods not only resolve immediate disputes but also rebuild trust and relationships, laying the foundation for long-term collaboration. This aligns with Vides Saade and Halder's *Minding the Gap* (2023), which advocates for incorporating indigenous wisdom and restorative practices into modern therapeutic frameworks. These perspectives reinforce the idea that therapeutic conflictology transcends traditional methods by emphasizing healing, connection, and community resilience in workplace settings.

The significance of emotional resilience and intelligence in managing workplace conflict cannot be overstated. Research by Kundi et al. (2023) in *The International Journal of Conflict Management* underscores the critical role of emotional intelligence in mitigating the negative impacts of interpersonal conflicts, such as workplace

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
