### INTRODUCTION

Mountain regions, characterized by their natural beauty and cultural richness, are increasingly becoming popular destinations for tourism. However, this popularity brings challenges related to environmental sustainability and cultural preservation. Sustainable tourism seeks to mitigate the adverse effects of tourism while enhancing its benefits for local communities (UNWTO, 2020). The balance between tourism development and sustainability is particularly critical in mountainous areas, where the unique ecological and cultural attributes are at risk of degradation (Buckley, 2012; Weaver, 2011). In India, regions such as Himachal Pradesh and Uttarakhand are prime examples of areas where tourism growth has led to both economic opportunities and environmental challenges (Kumar & Kumar, 2017). Rapid tourism expansion

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in these regions has raised concerns about its impact on local ecosystems, infrastructure, and social structures (Gossling, 2015; Mason, 2015). Addressing these concerns requires a detailed understanding of how tourism affects these communities and the development of strategies to manage these impacts effectively. In October 2023, the Himachal Pradesh Government and the Himachal Pradesh Eco Tourism Society designated 11 locations to extensively promote ecotourism. The sites renowned for their scenic and natural beauty include Swaar, Saurabh Van Vihar, Neugal Park, Bir-Billing in the Palampur forest division, Kasol, Kheer Ganga, and Sumarupa in the Parvati forest division, Sojha in Seraj, Narkanda in Kotgarh, Shogi camping site, and Potter Hill camping site within the Shimla forest division. Himachal Pradesh is an excellent location for eco-camping. Pine Hill Eco Camp is an ecological resort located near Barog in Himachal Pradesh. This is an ideal destination for wildlife enthusiasts. Himachal Pradesh, adorned with stunning scenery, is a haven for tourists, with verdant valleys, towering snow-capped peaks, meandering rivers, exquisite temples, and ancient monasteries, all essential components of its ecotourism. Ecotourism yields beneficial outcomes in Himachal Pradesh by conserving natural resources, generating chances for exploration, fostering cultural understanding, and enhancing environmental awareness among the populace. Tourism, an essential element of global economic activity, has seen remarkable expansion over the years, becoming a significant catalyst for economic development in several countries.
