It can foster cultural preservation, create local jobs, and raise awareness of natural and cultural values (Vasadze & Ositashvili, 2021). However, it also poses risks to ecosystems and local traditions (Romeo et al., 2021). II. LITERATURE VIEW:

Economic Impact of Mountain Tourism:

Proceeds in mountain tourism, chiefly in such areas as the Himalayas and the Caucasus, are both the possibilities and threats to the locals and the nature. The subsequent sections present the major areas of this impact. Mountain tourism offers significant economic potential for many communities, providing income diversification opportunities in regions with limited agricultural prospects (Debarbieux et al., 2014). Mountain tourism significantly impacts local economies, contributing to both direct and indirect economic benefits. Research indicates that mountain tourism generates substantial revenue through various channels, including accommodation, food services, and recreational activities, which in turn supports local employment and business development (Mohapatra & Biswas, 2024). For instance, Mohapatra and Biswas (2024) highlighted that the influx of tourists can lead to improved infrastructure and services, enhancing the overall economic landscape of mountain regions. Moreover, Kangai et al. (2024) emphasized the importance of sustainable practices in mountain tourism, suggesting that responsible tourism can mitigate environmental impacts while maximizing economic gains.
