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## **1. INTRODUCTION TO THE ROLE OF THE STATE IN HEALTH MANAGEMENT**

The advent of a modern public health system that improved health standards in Europe and world was the result of state intervention. The state's role in health management changed much over time. Far from the controversial debate about whether healthcare policies are important in improving health outcomes, the policy guidance provides an opportunity for policymakers to recognize the dominant pattern of healthcare in health policy and its impact on policy objectives.
