ABSTRACT

This article explores the formal limits of the Latin alphabet and the processes of its redefinition in the context of experimental calligraphy. Going beyond traditional calligraphy, this approach focuses on the dynamic relationships between writing and visual communication, highlighting the critical role of writing tools, ink and paint in the creative process. Methodological approaches to the reconstruction of letterforms are analyzed in an interdisciplinary framework. Thus, by going beyond the limitations of letter and form, a remarkable and inspiring understanding of how free and innovative creativity can be will be developed.

Calligraphy has held an important place among the writing arts throughout history, enriching the ways in which individuals express their creative ideas and aesthetic understanding through experimental approaches.
