1. INTRODUCTION

Over the past decade, medical tourism has undergone a significant transformation. Once driven primarily by cost savings and access to specific procedures, the sector has increasingly shifted toward addressing mental and emotional wellbeing. Rising levels of work-related stress, burnout, social anxiety, and post-pandemic psychological strain have reshaped traveler expectations, leading to growing demand for destinations that offer emotional security, psychological restoration, and long-term mental rejuvenation. Contemporary wellness travelers seek not only clinical processes but also environments that support emotional balance and inner recovery. Reflecting this shift, wellness tourism has expanded into a USD 651 billion global industry, with mental wellness emerging as one of its fastest-growing segments (Global Wellness Institute, 2022). Accordingly, academic focus has evolved from economic explanations of medical tourism toward emotional, psychological, and experiential dimensions of wellness travel (Connell, 2013; Hall, 2011).

This transformation has been closely accompanied by the rise of digital marketing. Wellness destinations now rely heavily on immersive digital communication—such as virtual tours, social media storytelling, influencer narratives, and emotionally framed brand content—to shape traveler perceptions. Research in tourism psychology demonstrates that emotionally charged digital narratives significantly influence destination trust, attachment, and perceived therapeutic value (Kim & Fesenmaier, 2017). Digital wellness communication increasingly functions as psychological priming, shaping expectations of healing and framing wellness experiences within culturally meaningful contexts even before travel occurs (Tussyadiah, 2020).

Within this global landscape, Asia and Europe have emerged as two dominant regions in mental wellness tourism, yet their digital communication approaches differ markedly. Asian wellness traditions—rooted in Ayurveda, Traditional Chinese Medicine (TCM), Zen philosophy, forest therapy, and holistic beauty–wellness practices—conceptualize mental wellness as an integration of mind, body, spirit, and environment. Consequently, Asian digital wellness marketing tends to emphasize symbolic imagery, sensory engagement, ritualistic narratives, and cultural authenticity (Smith & Puczko, 2014). For example, Indian Ayurvedic retreats combine spiritual symbolism with therapeutic language, while Chinese digital platforms foster community-based emotional reassurance grounded in TCM principles (Wang & Fan, 2022). Japan and South Korea similarly integrate traditional healing philos-

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
